1. Tell us an interesting fact about yourself that not many people know.

I opened the first all girl cub scout pack in the country.

2. What book made most impact on you as a child?

The Borrowers by Mary Norton; the idea that there were little people living under the floor boards having adventures really fired my imagination and I spent many nights pretending to go to sleep then using a torch to see if I could spot any in my bedroom.

3. What is your favourite film, and why?

I think Pretty Woman has to be my choice. I saw it at the cinema at a time when my life had been turned upside down and it felt like the start of the better days. It's really just a fairy tale but we all need a happy ending don't we?

4. What are your main hobbies/interests, apart from reading, of course?

I have lots of hobbies including tap dancing (which I started when I was 50), I run 2 choirs, I paint (pictures not walls) but mostly I write. I published a book called The Library Ladies and the Body behind the Library under my maiden name Marie Green and I am hoping to publish the next one in the series in Spring this year - The Library Ladies and the Killer Companion. They are cozy, comedy, murder mysteries with the main characters based on me and 4 of my friends who worked in a library together for 10 years.

5. What would be the three things you would like to have if you were stranded on a desert island?

My Kindle (so I'd have access to lots of books), my laptop so I could write and my art supplies.

I also have a passion to prevent and eradicate homelessness, no one in a country as wealthy as ours should be without a secure home although I do understand that there are many complex issues that lead to homelessness so the solution will need to be multi channel and organisations.

10. Who is the person who has influenced you most/you most admire?

Career influence would go to Mike Brown, he was the CEO when I worked at bdht in Bromsgrove and he encouraged and supported me to achieve a potential I didn't realise I had. Most admire - probably my mom, she was a simple lady who made sure I got the support and encouragement I needed and loved her simple life. She was married to my dad for over 60 years and she enjoyed the small things, never longing for more than she had a chance of getting and that is a great lesson to learn.

11. What is your connection to Evesham?

I am the CEO of Citizens Advice South Worcestershire and one of our main offices is in Port Street in Evesham. Prior to that as a young family we would visit Evesham and have holidays here in my mom and dad's caravan. It felt like miles from Birmingham and me and my children have fabulous memories of Evesham.
