John Donne was controversial even in the early 17th century. He wrote some of the most sensitive and moving love poetry in the English language but also became Dean of St Paul's Cathedral. He grew up a Catholic but converted to Protestantism in an age when religion and politics were so interwoven people were burnt at the stake for their beliefs. He gave some of the greatest sermons ever, with crowds queuing to hear him, but was forever conscious of his own mortality. As he said, "Ask not for whom the bell tolls - it tolls for thee".

Our speaker, Jeremy Holmes, has worked in advertising and higher education. Now semi-retired he is a trustee



of various charities. In his youth he won a scholarship and took a Double First in English Literature at Oxford.

Described as 'The man Leicester Cathedral chose to bury a king', Revd Pete Hobson offers a unique perspective on Richard's final journey from discovery to reburial. For Pete, this was a once in a lifetime project. There was no precedent for reburying a king and the eyes of the world were watching closely. The subject of many books and a recent film, the story of Richard III is one that continues to capture the imagination. Pete Hobson is author of *How to Bury A King – The Reinterment of King Richard III*.

Passionate about communicating science to the public, Professor Turi King's academic research at Leicester University bridges the gap between genetics and archaeology. She is best known for her work in 'cracking one of the biggest forensic DNA cases in history', leading the genetic analysis that led to confirmation of the identity of King Richard III. This talk is the perfect follow on to the previous talk about the reburial of Richard III.



From Exotic 18th Century Mughal India to Europe

Author Moin Mir was last with us in 2019. This talk about his latest novel, *The Lost Fragrance of Infinity*, takes us on a journey from exotic 18th century Mughal India to Europe.

It is the story of a tile maker who flees Delhi in 1739 after the Persian King invades and makes his way to Andalusia. The geometric Islamic tile trail that spans Mughal Delhi, Samarkand, Isfahan, Ottoman Istanbul, Cordoba and Granada (Spain) becomes his means of survival and it's through the restoration of these fabulous tiles that he restores his life. Finally in Andalusia the tile maker restores the tile work in the Alhambra eventually falling in love with a Spanish village girl. But Spain in the 18th century is deeply Catholic and the east-west love faces enormous challenges.

A Times of India 2021 Top 5 book, and described as a swirling historical epic in which craft, poetry and philosophy merge seamlessly in a story of passionate love, loss, compassion, psychological reckoning and redemption, *The Lost Fragrance of Infinity* is a celebration of human diversity and multicultural identities.

He is also author of the Holmes & Hudson Series, about Sherlock Holmes's housekeeper, with his publisher demanding that he expands that series.


Her first novel, *Little Face*, was published in 2006. Since then she has written 12 novels in the Waterhouse and Zailer series, as well as other works. Two of her novels, *The Point of Rescue*, and *The Other Half Lives*, have been produced for TV as two-part drama series.

In addition to works of her own devising, Sophie has written a series of four novels based on Agatha Christie's Hercule Poirot. Signed up by the Christie estate to continue the Belgian detective's legacy, her first Poirot novel saw his first authorised appearance in a novel since Agatha Christie published *Curtain*, some 39 years earlier.

In 2022 Simon Whaley delivered a great workshop on Travel Writing. He returns in 2023 for a workshop on Creative Non-Fiction, which he says is not about making up facts! Instead, it's about being creative in how we convey those facts. Whether you enjoy writing travel, biography or memoir, nature/landscape pieces, food writing or simply want to improve your journalling, creative non-fiction can transform your writing, and, therefore, your reader's experience. This two-hour workshop will explore four creative non-fiction techniques that will make your true stories read like fiction.

Simon began writing in his early teens and after a couple of years saw his first published piece (a word-search puzzle!). Fifteen years later, in January 2004, he packed in the day job to become a full-time writer. He's the bestselling author of *One Hundred Ways For A Dog To Train Its Human*, among other books, the writer of several hundred British travel, walking and general magazine features, and he's a bit of a photographer, too!

Joanna Cannon's journey from junior doctor to best-selling author is both remarkable and inspiring. Leaving school at 15, and then returning to study for A levels in her thirties would be enough of a challenge for many, let alone then signing up to do a medical degree. She worked as a junior doctor before specialising in psychiatry, and then left the profession to concentrate on her writing career.

She is best known for her debut novel, *The Trouble with Goats and Sheep*, published in 2016, famously written in an NHS car park in her lunchbreaks. This was followed by *Three Things About Elsie* (2018), and a memoir, *Breaking and Mending* (2019). Her third novel, *A Tidy Ending*, was released in 2022. Her first two novels were both Sunday Times bestsellers and Richard and Judy picks. Together her books have sold almost a million copies and been translated into 14 languages. She is a regular panellist on TV and radio, and at literary festivals across the country. She was last with us in 2019 and we are thrilled to welcome her back to Evesham.

Desert Island Poems with Alistair McGowan**Evesham Rowing Club, £12**

Festival Patron, and 'local lad', Alistair McGowan, is best known as an impressionist, comic, actor, singer and writer. He will be remembered to British audiences, and became a household name, for *The Big Impression*, which was, for four years, one of BBC1's top-rated comedy programmes, winning numerous awards, including a BAFTA in 2003. He has also worked extensively in theatre, including appearances in the West End, and performed some of the voices for the ITV television series *Spitting Image*. More recently he has proved to be an accomplished classical pianist, with *The Piano Show* combining stand-up comedy, impressions and what has been described as "some remarkably sensitive keyboard recital pieces."

We are thrilled to have Alistair with us tonight. An inspired and inspiring entertainer, this evening Alistair will talk to us about his love of poetry, and share with us some of the poems that he has treasured most throughout his life.





The Great Train Robbery – 60 Years On**Evesham Rowing Club, £9**

2023 marks the 60th Anniversary of The Great Train Robbery, an event that saw the theft of £2.6 million from a Royal Mail train heading from Glasgow to London on the West Coast Main Line in the early hours of 8th August 1963. After tampering with the lineside signals to bring the train to a halt, a gang of 15, attacked the train.

Ian Boskett from Tewkesbury has studied the events of 8th August and the subsequent investigations and enquiries. Ian has uncovered some fascinating local connections with the heist. Some items connected with the heist, all supposedly destroyed, have quite recently resurfaced! So just how did the gang tamper with the signals? Ian will tell the story and give a live demonstration!



SS Suevic – A Tale of Shipwreck and Survival**Holland House, Crophorne, £20****Tickets via Holland House:****www.hollandhouse.org****E: enquiries@hollandhouse.org, or T: 01386 860330**

The SS Suevic was a steamship, built specifically to service the Liverpool-Cape Town-Sydney route. She ran aground in a storm near the Lizard Point in Cornwall 116 years ago, in 1907. It is a truly remarkable story. 456 people were rescued by the RNLI over some 16 hours with no lives lost. This is still the largest number of people rescued by the RNLI in a single operation.

Galen Bartholomew is a keen family historian. Two of his relatives were amongst those rescued. His illustrated talk will describe how he pieced together an extraordinary story - how the Suevic ran aground; the dramatic circumstances of the rescue; the salvage and rebuilding of the ship (in what was the largest salvage operation ever undertaken at that time); and the Suevic's final years as a whaling factory ship in the Antarctic, before being scuttled off Sweden to avoid capture by German warships. A remarkable tale of shipwreck and survival.




